POST-SPRAIN PAIN

Mark and Dee Ruether of Austin are proud to announce the birth of their first child, a son, born April 19, 1998, at 8:17 p.m.

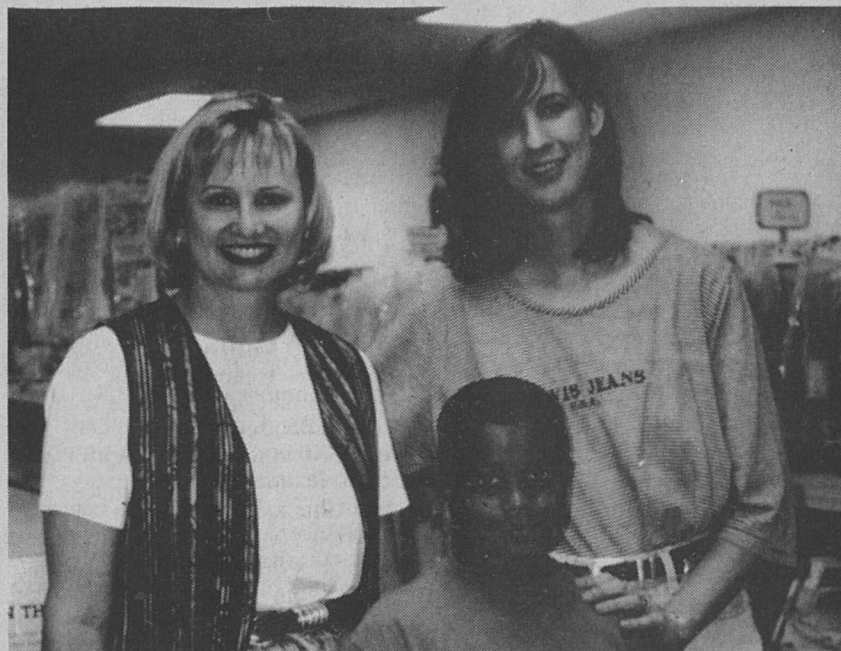
Mason Dominick weighed eight pounds, four ounces and measured 21 inches at birth.

Volunteering is alive at ELPS

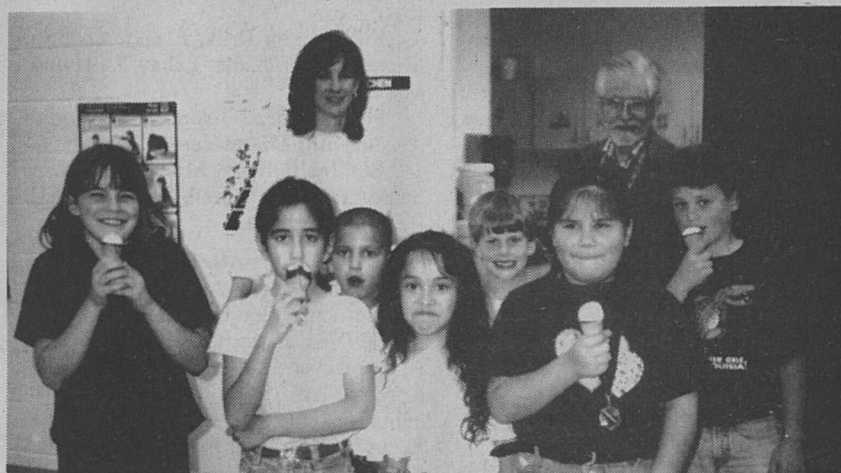

The Eagle Lake Primary School is fortunate to have a Volunteer Program, sponsored by the Christ Episcopal Church of Eagle Lake.

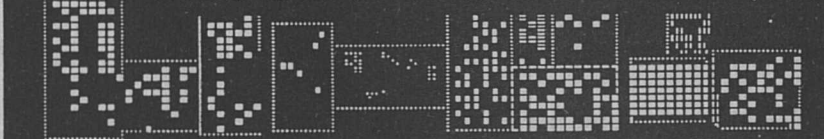
