Over the past years, Margo's service to Eagle Lake and Colorado County has included many facets. 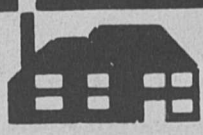
Class of 1946 planning reunion

May is Designated Better Sleep Month

The Better Sleep Council has designated May as *Better Sleep Month*. This is a good time to review some of the problems that up to one-third of the US population has falling asleep and staying asleep. Sleep problems include *sleep apnea* (brief periods of not breathing while asleep), *narcolepsy* (extreme sleepiness at abnormal times of the day), and *parasomias* (sleep walking and night terrors). Sleep specialists may need to conduct tests to determine the cause of the problem. Medicines sometimes prescribed for sleep problems include prescription drugs called "sedative hypnotics" or a nonprescription antihistamine, such as *diphenhydramine*.

The American Medical Association Family Medical Guide provides these recommendations if there are no other major health problems present:

- Do not take work to bed with you. Light reading is okay.
- Participate in some type of physical exercise during the day so that you feel tired at night.
- Take a warm bath before bed to help you relax.
- Make sure the bed is comfortable and that the room is not too hot or too cold.
- If you toss and turn, get out of bed and stay up until you begin to feel tired or sleepy.
