Eagle Lake Mayor Michael Cooper recently met with TCI Cable Regional Manager Dan Hebert.

At the conclusion of that meeting, Cooper requested a letter outlining what was verbally committed to during the meeting.

As Cooper told Hebert, "We don't want the Taj Mahal. Just get us some indoor plumbing."

Hebert was reminded that there are disparities between cable service in Eagle Lake and Columbus. "We're kind of like the stepchild. Bring us an equivalent package," Cooper told He-

Cooper also reminded Hebert that no one will be interested in going with TCI when it comes time to negotiate the franchise if nothing is happening.

The City gave every indication that it would look elsewhere when the franchise expires in July 2002 unless service is improved tremendously.

The City has played the scenario, 'promises, promises, promises", with TCI for several years, but it now has something written.
