Two Drugs Helpful for Prostate Enlargement

Enlargement of the prostate (called benign prostatic hyperplasia or BPH) occurs in more than half of men over age 50, in up to 80% of men over 60, and in more than 90% of men over age 90. This harmless enlargement of prostate gland is considered a natural part of the aging process. However, as the gland gets larger it begins to squeeze the urethra (tube that carries urine from the bladder to outside the body). If the urethra constricts to a great degree, the flow of urine can be obstructed. Symptoms of BPH may include urinary frequency, especially at night, and passing only a dribble of urine (incomplete voiding). Some men experience painful urination, while others do not.

Treatment of BPH may involve a surgical procedure called transurethral resection. The success rate of this procedure is reported to be about 85%. Fortunately, we also have two prescription medicines which have relieved symptoms in many men. These medicines are terazosin (Hytrin) and doxazosin (Cardura). Both drugs have shown an ability to increase urinary flow and reduce the irritating symptoms associated with BPH. Medicines appear to be most beneficial in men who suffer mild to moderate symptoms.
