Alcario Barrios Jr. of Eagle Lake, charged with possession of a controlled substance, was tried by jury Monday and Tuesday, May 18 and 19, in District Court in Columbus.

Barrios, found guilty, elected to go before the judge for sentencing. Wednesday, May 20, he was sentenced to 50 years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

He was on probation for possession of a controlled substance when the above mentioned charge was lodged against him. Therefore, the probation was revoked and he received seven additional years. The sentences will run concurrent.
