Court Opens Records Policy Drafted

The Texas Judicial Council's committee on court records met in Dallas last week to present a draft of a new policy that would increase public access to court records.

Last fall, Tom Phillips, chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court, ordered the committee to draft an openrecords policy. Phillips' action came after he was criticized for overruling an opinion by Attorney General Mostruggled so hard to get in the first rales that state judge's telephone records should not be closed to the public.




