



Medicines Cause and Relieve Intestinal Gas

Intestinal gas (flatulence) that gets worse when eating fatty foods or occurs along with pain in the upper right part of the abdomen could be a sign of gallbladder problems. If gas pain seems to be worse when you bend or lie down, the problem could be associated with acid reflux and heartburn. The most common cause of intestinal gas is air swallowing. Air swallowing seems to occur when we eat, chew gum, or smoke cigarettes. Foods that may produce intestinal gas include beans and cabbage.

Medicines that can cause gas include the cholesterol-lowering agents, several of the nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory agents such as ibuprofen, and the new weight control medicine orlistat (Xenical). Orlistat inhibits fat enzymes in the gastrointestinal tract. The overall effect of the drug is to block the absorption of fats from the intestine. Since the drug works only in the intestine, adverse effects tend to be limited to the intestinal area. Such effects may include soft stools, abdominal pain, nausea, and gas.

Simethicone, alone or combined with antacids, may help decrease or eliminate intestinal gas. Simethicone causes gas bubbles to come together so they can be passed more easily.
