The Attwater's prairie chicken is a species literally on the brink of extinc-

Historically, up to 1 million prairie chickens occupied some 6 million acres of prairie grasslands from southwestern Louisiana to at least the Nueces River in Texas.

However, prairie chicken numbers have steadily declined due to loss of habitat, catastrophic weather, predators, fire ants and possibly disease and/or genetic problems.

In the spring of 1998, a total of 56 wild Attwater's prairie chickens remained in three geographically separated populations located in Colorado (on the refuge), Galveston and Refugio Counties.




