A proposal for advertisement for a vendor contract was authorized for the track project. Courts-N-Stuff of Brookshire, who did the initial inspection, proposed a turnkey project at a cost of \$213,146.

All six poles at the baseball field have woodpecker damage as an inspection by Barbee Services ascertained. The safety of the poles is being questioned.

Barbee will make a recommendation as to the type of pole that needs to be installed.

All of these projects will be financed with funds from the Capital Projects Fund.

"We have questions that need to be answered from Austin concerning our state funds. I would like us to hold off on a final decision on these projects," said Trustee Jim Wiese.

The Board also increased break-

EAGLE LAKE POLICE REPORT

There will be many avenues for interaction between the cadets and citizens that will help these young people grow and develop into responsible people.

When they reach a certain level of achievement and have earned the right to participate, the cadet will be allowed, under close supervision, to do restitution work (community service).

A volunteer program is currently being set in place by the Boot Camp so that individuals and groups can take part in spiritual, educational, mentoring and social activities for the male and female cadets.

Anyone who desires to volunteer in any capacity must be approved by the Administration.

The Advisory Board encourages you to make application as soon as possible in order to be ready when the program begins.

Approved volunteers will be required to take part in a short training session before they can have contact with the cadets.

Applications may be obtained at the Boot Camp, First National Bank, from any Advisory Board members or at most local churches.

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Combination Improves Diabetes Control

Type II diabetes (also called adult onset diabetes) is a condition in which the body produces some insulin, but the insulin that is produced does not work adequately. The condition affects about 15 million Americans (about half of this number have not been diagnosed) and is most common in adults over age 40. A number of oral medicines have been developed in recent years to improve insulin utilization and control of blood glucose (sugar) in this type of diabetes.

A few months ago a study in *The New England Journal of Medicine* reported that taking two medicines for type II diabetes gave greater control of diabetes than taking either of the drugs alone. The medicines studied were *trogliatzone* (Rezulin) and *metformin* (glucophage). They work by different mechanisms, which seems to be the reason why they are more effective when given together. Metformin does several different things. It lowers the production of glucose in the liver, decreases the amount of glucose absorbed from the intestine, and improves insulin sensitivity, making it easier for insulin to handle glucose. Trogliatzone improves the ability of muscles to respond to insulin and to take up the glucose that is present.
