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
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Type II diabetes (also called adult onset diabetes) is a condition in which the body produces some insulin, but the insulin that is produced does not work adequately. The condition affects about 15 million Americans (about half of this number have not been diagnosed) and is most common in adults over age 40. A number of oral medicines have been developed in recent years to improve insulin utilization and control of blood glucose (sugar) in this type of diabetes.

A few months ago a study in The New England Journal of Medicine reported that taking two medicines for type II diabetes gave greater control of diabetes than taking either of the drugs alone. The medicines studied were troglitazone (Rezulin) and metformin (glucophage). They work by different mechanisms, which seems to be the reason why they are more effective when given together. Metformin does several different things. It lowers the production of glucose in the liver, decreases the amount of glucose absorbed from the intestine, and improves insulin sensitivity, making it easier for insulin to handle glucose. Troglitazone improves the ability of muscles to respond to insulin and to take up the glucose that is present.
