THE COMMON ANKLE SPRAIN

Sprains are the most common ankle injury, and many of us know all too well the sharp pain that can be caused by a fall, a bad twist when pivoting quickly in a sport, or even misstepping on the stairs or uneven ground. The most common ankle sprain is the inversion sprain, which occurs when the foot torques inward and under the leg. Inversion sprains cause injury just below the ankle joint on the outside of the foot, but the entire foot may swell and turn black-and-blue. Any ankle injury that can't be walked off in a short time should be treated because ankle sprains and strains that do not heal properly may lead to life-long ankle instability.
