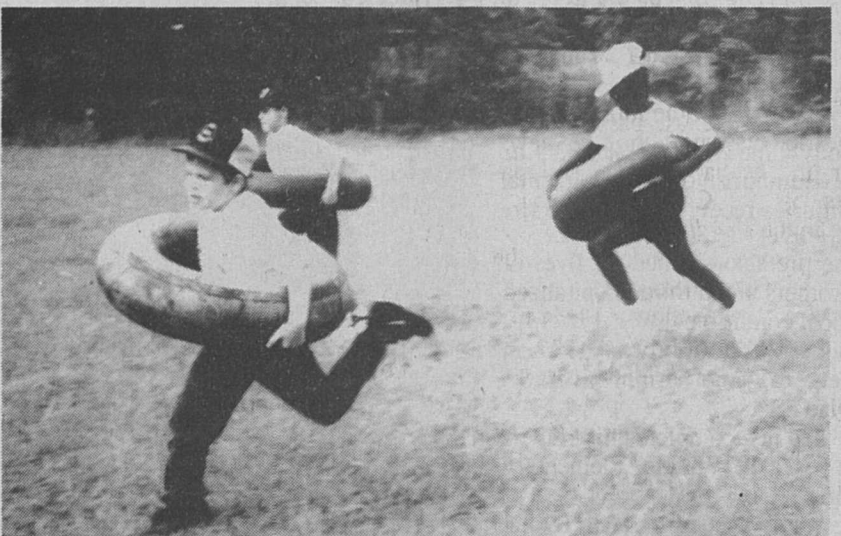

Ag. Commissioner candidate Combs to be in Columbus

Susan Combs, candidate for Texas Agriculture Commissioner, will be at the Live Oak Art Center, 1014 Milam in Columbus Friday, July 10, from 1 to 2 p.m.

She hopes to meet many of the citizens of Colorado County and anyone who has an interest in agriculture and ranching. Everyone is invited and refreshments will be served.

A fourth generation Texas rancher, Susan Combs has run a cow-calf operation in Brewster County in West Texas for the past 17 years. It's the same ranch her great grandfather established more than a hundred years ago.

Susan is a graduate of the University of Texas Law School and a former Assistant District Attorney in Dallas.

In 1992, Susan was elected to the Texas House of Representatives. Fellow Republicans chose her as President of the Freshman GOP class. Republicans and Democrats together named her Vice-President of the House Freshmen. She went on to be re-elected to a second term without opposition.

While in the legislature, Susan's proud to have been the House author of the Private Real Property Rights Preservation Act of 1995 which protects Texas landowners.

After leaving the Legislature, Susan served as the State Director for U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, running all of her state senate offices.

Susan is active in several agricultural groups. She's on the boards of the

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association as well as the Texas Wildlife Association.

Susan's background in ranching is what led her to run for Texas Agriculture Commissioner. That experience along with her record of public service has earned her a reputation as an advocate for farming and ranching statewide.

Susan earned an impressive 75% of the vote in the March 10 primary election.

Prior to the primary, she received the Farm Bureau Ag Fund's key endorsement as well as the support of every other statewide group that endorsed in the primary. She also received the endorsement of every major newspaper in the state.
