

Please call the Family Services Department at 512-237-4824 or 1-800-688-9065 between 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday, to make an appointment.

This program is based on household income, household size and need for assistance. Eligibility for participation is established according to federal income guidelines.
