Montgomery-Thatcher Historical Cemetery Association holds meeting

The Montgomery-Thatcher Historical Cemetery Association met Saturday, June 27, at the cemetery located on FM 950 to dedicate a cenotaph to honor members of the pioneer Montgomery and Thatcher families who are believed buried in the cemetery but now can not be found.

Carol Beth Gore, President of the Association welcomed 41 members and guests. The Rev. Russell Minter, Pastor of Christ Episcopal Church gave the invocation.

The Honorable Mayor Pro-Tem Barbara Pidgeon presented a Proclamation in recognition of the Association's 20 years of preservation and restoration of the cemetery that was first used in July 1836 and in continued use until 1926. Frances E. Hutchings, organizing President accepted on behalf of the Association.

The following is a brief description of those named on the newly dedicated cenotaph.

James Thatcher who was born and Association. died on the same day and has no tombstone. Family tradition tells us he was buried on the battlefield of San Jac-

His mother, Sarah Mirah Montgomery Thatcher, was one of many women who quickly gathered a few belongings to rush ahead of the Mexican soldiers of Santa Ana in the Run Away Scrape.

Later, she and George Thatcher returned to the battlefield to reclaim his body but were unable to find his grave. His name is on the cenotaph.

Laura Ann Montgomey McNeel Wynn was born in Jefferson County Mississippi and came to Texas with her parents, Frances Gilbert and James S. Montgomery, in 1835. She married John Shelby McNeel and they had three children.

After his death at Koble's Spring near Columbus on 19 Aug. 1852, according to letters at that time, his body was brought to the Montgomery Plantation and buried that evening. Later, Laura Ann married W.L Wynn. She died 17 Sept. 1855.

Clara Lane Lovell and John Beard were introduced and spoke on their ancestor, Judge James Webb, who was the brother of Dr. Thomas Francis Webb. Dr. Webb came to the Montgomery Plantation as a physician after graduating from Transylvania University in Kentucky. He married Jane Montgomery 17 August 1845.

Jane was born in Jefferson County Mississippi 22 March 1826 and came to Texas with her parents, Frances Gilbert and James S. Montgomery. Jane and Thomas Webb had four children. Jane died 7 August 1878 and Dr. Webb died 23 May 1889.
