Eagle Lake's 1998 sales tax rebates keep ahead of 1997

week delivered a total of \$255.8 mil-12.4% increase over the \$227.6 million allocated in Aug. 1997.

The City of Eagle Lake received a rebate in the amount of \$14,546.11, 6.36% above the \$13,675.39 received last Aug.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales tax collected by quarterly filers for April, May and June and reported to the Comptroller

"The Texas job market and new businesses are still growing steadily and retail sales continue to soar, as consumers show confidence in a rosy outlook for the Texas economy," Sharp said. "Year-to-date, rebates to cities and counties are up 11.5% over last year.'
