Tax

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12.5% over the Aug. 1997 payment of \$10.9 million. Year-to-date, San Antonio has received a 10.2% increase in local sales tax payments.

The Austin sales tax allocation for Aug. was \$9.5 million, reflecting an increase of 12.2% from the Aug. 1997 payment of \$8.5 million. For the first eight months of 1998, Austin's sales tax rebates are 12.7% more than those for last year.

Ft. Worth's \$7.1 million Aug. sales tax allocation was 14.3% more than the City's rebate of \$6.2 million for Aug. of last year, putting year-to-date rebates 11.2% ahead of 1997.

Arlington received \$6.7 million in sales tax allocation, down 2.2% from

the \$6.9 million payment for the same month last year. However, Arlington's rebates are running 3.1% ahead of those for the first eight months of last year.

El Paso's sales tax rebate of \$4.1 million was up 10.2% over the \$3.7 million payment delivered in Aug. 1997. El Paso's local sales tax payments year-to-date are 6.3% ahead of those for the first eight months of 1997.

Aug. sales tax rebates to other selected Texas cities, along with their increases year-to-date, were:

- Irving, \$4.3 million, up 10.2%;
- Plano, \$3.7 million, up 13.1%;
- Corpus Christi, \$2.7 million, up

6.8%;

- Abilene, \$2.4 million, up 7%;
- Lubbock, \$2.4 million, up 4.7%;
- Abilene, \$1.6 million, up 7.4%;

Other cities in our area, the amount of their sales tax rebate this month along with the change from the same month last year are:

- Columbus, \$78,176.29, up 14.85%;
- Weimar, \$16,731.57, up 15.02%;
- Sealy, \$116,979.35, up 68.30%*;
- Bellville, \$32,624.12, up 28.52%;
- El Campo, \$180,512.11, up 5.39%;
- and Wharton, \$115,892.68, up 15.16%.

Year-to-date for the above cities and the change from last year are: Columbus, \$493,412.39, +12.64%;

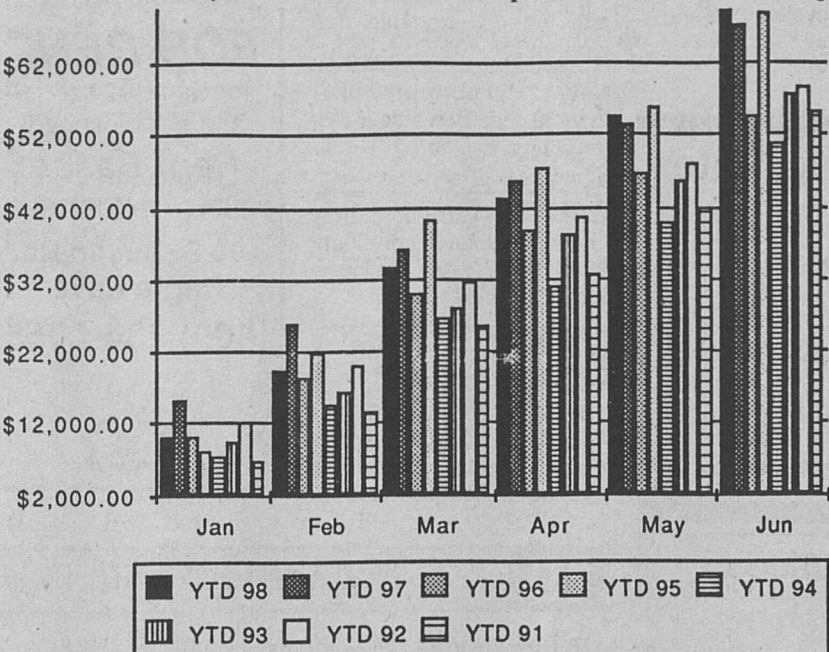
- Weimar, \$91,589.73, +13.49%;
- Sealy, \$780,511.12, +70.76%*;
- Bellville, \$176,381.50, +17.21%;
- El Campo, \$1,162,597.94, +6.49%;
- and Wharton, \$703,739.20, +3.94%.

On the county level, Colorado County received \$62,396.13, down 3.09% from last year's payment of \$64,388.12. Austin County received \$99,781.80, up 26.07%. Wharton County received \$125,385.77, up 13.06%.

Year-to-date figures for these counties are, Colorado, \$399,978.69, down 3.30%; Austin, \$632,947.69, +24.80%; Wharton, \$816,567.94, +8.90%.

Due to the Labor Day holiday, the Comptroller's next sales tax allocation, normally delivered on the second Friday of each month, is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 14.

*Sealy increased their portions from 1% to 1.5% in Oct. 1997, therefore, this is not an accurate comparison.



The year-to-date totals of the City of Eagle Lake's sales tax rebates are charted against the month the tax was collected, not when the City received the rebate.
