As summer draws to a close this Labor Day weekend, many families will take advantage of the last vacation opportunity.

Foot Facts

INGROWN AND FUNGUS NAILS

The usual symptoms of ingrown and fungus nails are swelling, redness, and pain at one or both corners of the toenail. If the tissue overgrowing the nail becomes infected, you may also see evidence of pus. For most people, an ingrown nail is easily remedied and of minor consequence; however, any infection in a diabetic's foot — especially one where the circulation is impaired — can lead to loss of limb. A diabetic patient with even a potential infection should see a podiatrist promptly. For people without complication, soaks, ointments, and correct cutting and filing of nails may alleviate the problem. If conservative measures fail to correct or provide relief, podiatric surgery can most often be performed on an outpatient basis.

Feet seem especially susceptible to nail problems of all kinds, including ingrown and fungal nails. It might be because of all the time they spend in dark, moist places, or it might be because of the lack of attention they get.
