tor Dalton Sherrill, by law, short-term detainees must have one hour of unrestricted recreation time each day.

The evening of the escape, the detainees were taken out for their recreation time at around 8:30. When they were brought in, three were missing.

A hole was cut in the south side of the fence where there is tall grass, sometime after 6:30 p.m. when the perimeter was last checked and 8:30, when the group was taken out.

The Eagle Lake youth who assisted with the escape were named by the first escapee apprehended and were picked up that same evening.

And where are the five as of now? The three escapees are presently in the boot camp facility, two awaiting a trip to TYC following a hearing in Wharton County on charges unrelated to the escape.

The third is awaiting further charges and legal action.

The juvenile who aided in the escape has been released to his parents and juvenile probation and the 17 year old escape facilitator has been released on bond from the Colorado County Detention Facility.

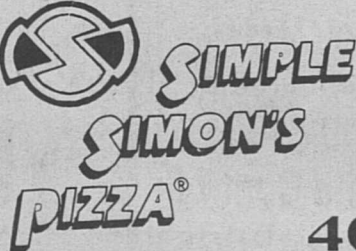

The Court also heard complaints and/or requests from Leah Ross, Lori Moore and Jim Brisco of Sheridan in regard to the current road conditions in their community during its "public comment" section. They were assured

by Elstner that the roads in question would be repaired as soon as the weather permitted.

In other business, the Court:
•Approved a request by the Sheridan Parks and Recreation Center Inc.

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(SPARC) to transfer funds, totaling \$15,000 of the \$17,342 balance in Texas Capital Funds account, to be used for the completion of the concession stand at Sheridan Waterpark instead of the opening of Main Street;

•Approved requests from Don Easton, emergency management coordinator, for a cellular phone and County Clerk Darlene Hayek for an additional phone line, but did not authorize the payment for a new phone line for the county attorney's office since County Attorney John Moore reportedly did not follow County policy; and

•Received an update from Easton on the status of flood damage in the County.
