CHILDREN'S FOOT PROBLEMS

Thirteen percent of all children experience some degree ofinting. The foot may turn in due to twisting of the foot itself, or there may be torsion of the tibia (shin) or thigh. When this deformity is caused by a twist in the foot, it is called metatarsus adductus, or hooked feet. The foot may be bent at an angle, resulting from the child's position in utero. Until the 1970s, the prevailing thought was to correct these conditions with braces and orthopedic shoes; however, more recently, doctors find the condition generally improves just as well on its own by age 8 or 12 years. If your child's feet cause pain or an abnormal gait, check with your podiatrist.

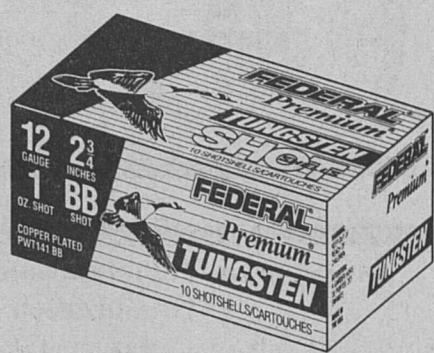

UNSIGHTLY SPACES

If your teeth have unsightly spaces, especially in front where the gaps will show every time you open your mouth, you may want to consider the composite resin bonding technique. Where applicable, this is a relatively less costly procedure and the results are excellent and getting even better with today's rapidly improving technology.

Composite resin is considered a versatile and useful material. It has many applications in dentistry. One is its use in correcting badly discolored teeth. Another is in filling unsightly gaps. Enough composite resin is ap-

plied to teeth on both sides of a gap so that the space is gradually diminished. When your dentist has completed the procedure the wide gap is gone and only a natural spacing remains.

This can make quite an improvement in the appearance of your teeth, wherever the gap happens to be. It is especially desirable when the unsightly gaps are in your front teeth. Ask your dentist about these new techniques.
