Contreras curates Prairie Edge Museum

Lucy Contreras probably didn't know what she was getting into when she accepted a position as half-time curatorial assistant and docent at Prairie Edge Museum (PEM).

Her varied work assignments, funded through the Senior Texas Employment Program (STEP), were indeed strange compared with her normal routine as a responsible Eagle Lake homemaker.

She also began an association with a "collection" of dedicated Museum devotees performing assorted tasks to live up exhibits.

"After all," Volunteer Curator Bill Harrison Sr. explained, "an exhibit case is exactly like a storefront window. The store attracts the passerby with attractive displays in order to sell its merchandise. Likewise, a museum display makes a pitch to sell neatly-packaged information."

Contreras thus found herself helping open exhibit cases to add to, subtract from, or re-do displays. This involves both physical and mental gymnastics. Every week the routine is different.

The last few weeks, she has been helping Harrison and his colleague Rollin Baker rearrange heavy and

awkward farm machinery in the new canopied display area.

A current major project is the rearranging of exhibit materials in storage. Contreras is highly aware that a museum's exhibits are only the tip of the iceberg with most of the material related to the history of the Eagle Lake area preserved under wraps.

On weekday mornings, for example, she and Chamber of Commerce Secretary Lana Dulany are handy to visitors bringing donations of historical items and getting details from donors about each object.

Ahead, Contreras looks forward with anticipation to a new and rewarding program of joining her colleagues in learning to operate a fancy computer program. It is designed to catalogue previous and future museum accumulations about Eagle Lake's heritage.

Incidentally, PEM is accepting monetary donations, large or small, to support the purchase of that rather pricey computer program package.

The Caucus will play a vital role in educating members about rural legislation, and the effect it has on their district and constituents.

First on the agenda is dealing with the statewide boll weevil eradication program, which is expected to be designated an emergency issue by Gov. George W. Bush.

The program currently relies on farmers to pay for the eradication program.

Boll weevils have steadily spread into Texas since 1894 and are the top threat to cotton, Texas' largest cash

crop. They destroy an estimated \$50 million of the state's crop each year.

Some lawmakers, citing last year's drought which hit Texas' farmers and rural areas, say it is important to focus on the concerns of rural Texans.

Although the issues are not exclusively unique to rural Texas, they play a major role in the welfare of all Texans.

The Caucus' elected officers are: Chair Hawley (D-Portland), and Vice-chairs Cook and Suzanna Gratia Hupp (R-Lampasas).
