Your answers to some of the most asked prairie-chicken questions

Q: What is an Attwater's into the wild to bolster dangerprairie-chicken? ously small populations. A

A: A chicken-sized bird that inhabits native coastal prairie habitat. Actually a grouse, this bird was once very numerous throughout coastal grasslands of Texas and southwest Louisiana. Today, fewer than 100 individuals remain.

Q: Why did Attwater's prairie-chicken numbers decline?

A: Like most species in trouble, the long-term decline of Attwater's prairie-chickens is due to habitat loss. Today, less than 1 percent of the once expansive coastal prairies that the Attwater's call home remain in relatively pristine condition. As the prairie became more fragmented, factors such as catastrophic weather, parasites, disease, inbreeding, fire ants, and other factors became increasingly important in their adverse impacts on prairie chicken populations.

Q: What is being done to help them out?

A: Drastic intervention is needed in the short-term to prevent the impending extinction of this critically imperilled bird. To that end, an aggressive captive-breeding program is under way to provide birds for release

ously small populations. A long-term solution will require strategic restoration of prairie habitat within the prairie chicken's historic range. Plans


