Blood clots inside the blood vessels can be harmful if they lead to



SWOLLEN LEGS The arterial blood supply brings oxygenated blood to the extremities. The venous blood supply brings oxygen-depleted blood back toward the lungs and heart to get fresh oxygen before being pumped out again. Because blood is subject to the force of gravity, nature designed our veins with little valves to keep blood moving. Without the valves in our veins, our blood would pool in our lowest

extremities. The blood is pumped through the veins by our muscle contractions every time we move. When we stand still, however, the pumping ceases and the capillary pressure increases. This forces fluid to leak into the tissues, causing swollen legs. Movement, even shifting weight from leg to leg, can keep the blood The components of the foot and leg are designed to work together, sharing the tremendous pressures of day-to-day living.
