## Dr. Russell works with Preceptorship Program

In 1999, Texas continues to seek ways to find more primary care physicians in both rural and urban areas.

For the past 22 years, the Texas Family Residency Program (TFRP) has trained family doctors to meet this need. Currently, there are 31 community-based Family Practice Residency Programs throughout the state.

As a part of this effort, the TFRP also funds the Texas Statewide Preceptorship Program (TSPP) in Family Practice.

Joel Underwood, currently a student attending UT-Houston, participated in the TSPP, under the preceptorship of R. Russell Thomas, D.O., of Eagle Lake.

The TSPP is designed to promote medical student interest in the specialized field of family practice.

Much credit of the successful program has been attributed to its involvement with the Texas Academy of Family Physicians (TAFP).

This association, with more than 5,500 members, has provided volunteer family physicians who served as preceptors to Texas medical students in conjunction departments of Family Practice.

Since its inception, the TSPP has enabled 3,248 clinical and 2,226 pre-clinical Texas medical students to work in the offices of experienced Texas family physicians, usually for a month at a time.

This exposure allows medical students to observe firsthand the challenges and the satisfactions of practicing

primary care, and to examine Family Practice as a serious personal career option.

A number of national studies have shown medical students are more likely to select a particular specialty based on the amount of exposure and quality of role models they encounter.

Jack Haley, M.D., and Lewis Foxhall, M.D., serve as co-coordinators for the TSPP.

The statewide preceptorship program is supported by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, utilizing funds established through the Texas Family Practice Residency Program (1977 House Bill 282).

Stipends enable participating students to offset living costs during their preceptorship.

An effective preceptorship can promote students' awareness of their clinical strengths and weaknesses, increase their self-confidence and facilitate their application of classroom knowledge to the problems encountered by the family physician.

The good news is that medical students are recognizing the need for and value of becoming family physicians. More students are choosing Family Practice, with Texas filling its highest number of Family Practice Residency slots than ever before.

As a result and in order to meet this demand, the 75th Texas Legislature increased the amount of state support for these medical education efforts by more than \$5 million for the next biennium.

## Consumer tax cuts for Texans signed into law

Rep. Robert L. "Robby" Cook (Eagle Lake-D) announced that Texas Gov. George W. Bush has signed into law a package of tax cuts to reduce sales taxes for Texas consumers by \$342 million over the next two years.

The legislation exempt non-prescription medicines from sales tax, provide a three day "sales tax holiday" on clothes and shoes at back-to-school time in Aug., and cuts sales taxes on Internet access charges and data processing services.

"Approximately 70% of the state surplus is dedicated to public education," said Cook. "We are now able to use the rest of the surplus to provide needed tax relief to Texas families."

All over-the-counter medicines will be exempted from state sales tax beginning in the spring of 2000.

Cook said the bill will help families buying back-to-school clothes by providing a three day tax-free period

on clothes and shoes. The tax holiday begins this year and applies to items that cost less than \$100.

The legislation also exempts from sales tax the first \$25 each month of Internet access charges beginning Oct. 1, 1999. It also reduces sales tax on data processing services.

In addition, agricultural processors locating or investing in rural counties or counties with high unemployment and low income will be exempt from sales taxes for items used in the business for two years after moving to the community or expanding their facilities.

"This legislation is very important to Texas families," said Cook. "Medication, items necessary for school and access to technology can be costly; therefore, any tax exemptions or reductions applicable in these areas will be of great assistance to the families of Texas."
