Assistant County Attorney issued citation by Sheriff's Department

The Colorado County Sheriff's report last week stated, "at 2:13 p.m. on June 9, Deputy Deborah Benavides responded to a call about a suspicious vehicle and subject on old Hwy. 90.

"The caller advised that the person had driven off. Benavides located the vehicle and bag and issued a citation for 'leaving refuse on the highway.'"

That person turned out to be Colorado County First Assistant County Attorney Joe Fling of Eagle Lake.

The ticket given by Benavides cited, "A black duffel bag with miscellaneous female clothing and sex devices as the liner items.

Benavides met the complaining individual at the scene. A short time later, the 1989 blue van drove by and the citation was issued.

The incident took place about a quarter mile west of the Columbus Oaks Apartment on Hwy 90.

The citation was processed by Pct. 3 Justice of the Peace Francis Truchard. The offense carries up to a \$500 fine. Truchard stated, citation Section 365.102 of the Texas Health Code and is a Class C misdemeanor.

Fling was unavailable Monday afternoon for a comment.

But, on Tuesday afternoon, the following comments were obtained from Julian Moore County Attorney. "Fling does admit he disposed of the items in a less than satisfactory manner. We sat down and talked about everything and Fling is, at this time, going through a probation period."

Six indictments remained sealed as of press time.

Moore also stated, "This is the lowest criminal environment you could have and still be charged with an offense. This was a lapse of judgement on Fling's part."

County Attorney Julian Moore

reported that in a conversation he held with Fling, Fling had said that he and his wife made the decision to make some changes in their personal life style, and eliminate certain things in their life, things that were not wrong, but things they chose to abandon, and he threw the items away.

Fling has until June 30 to respond. As of Monday, it was not known if he would contest the citation or not.

Houston murders, a fingerprint was matched, showing the fugitive had struck again.

Ironically as it may be, the Border Patrol had the fugitive on June 1, but let him go! This was halfway into his murder spree, just two days before the murder of Josephine Konvicka on June 4 and the murder of Noemi Dominguez on June 5. He was detained after he crossed into the United States illegally and released into Ciudad Juarez in the early morning hours of June 2.

Because Resendez-Ramirez was using an alias, one of 30 he uses, he was not in the INS fingerprint identification system which is primarily a database of information about illegal border crossings. INS computers do not do criminal checks.

Resendez-Ramirez was first detained for slipping into the United States illegally in 1976, has served state prison time in New Mexico and Florida, and has been deported at least four times.

Since the creation of the "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" list in 1950, 428 of 457 fugitives have been located; 134 as a result of assistance from citizens.

Ramirez told his wife he's "a dead man that won't be taken alive."

The command center is being flooded with tips. Let's hope this serial killer, who is extremely dangerous, will be located through the efforts

of the FBI and all other law enforcement agencies throughout the nation. In the meantime citizens are reminded to continue to use extreme security precautions around their homes. Also if there is a firearm use precaution and if you fire, make sure you know who or what the target is.

Note: Officials at FBI Headquar-

ters in Houston announced Monday that a Mexican birth certificate shows the rail hopping fugitive's real name to be Angel Leoncio Reyes Recendis, born Aug. 1959.

The name will be added to the 30 aliases use by Resendez-Ramirez the name that will remain on the FBI's Most Wanted.

on all manufactured homes which were already in place when the ordinance went into effect. The instances of deletion will be determined by the city. The amendment will "grandfather" the homes throughout the city.

In other business, Council:

•Set a minimum rate of \$100 to clean and mow a lot. The rate will be \$100 per hour per employee. Less than an hour will carry the minimum \$100.

•Went into executive session to discuss the purchase of 18.265 acres of Wintermann Foundation property.

The City will offer \$340 per acre for a total of \$6,210.10. The land will become a part of the municipal park and borders the creek behind the City sewer facilities.

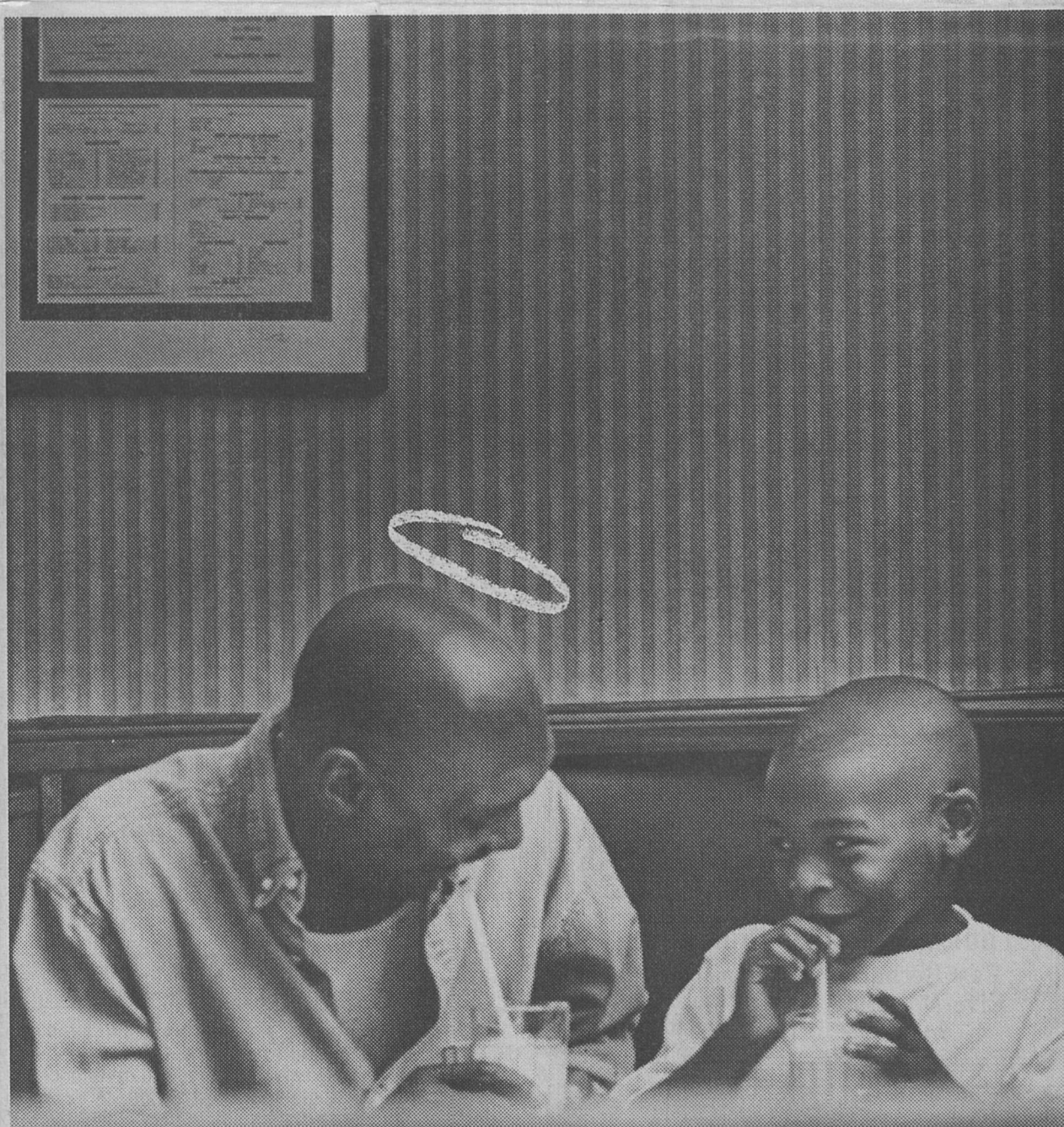

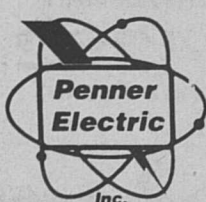
