of gasoline must be cut back to reduce tailpipe emissions from vehicles.

Cleaner gasoline and vapor recovery equipment will be required in a 95county area along and east of Interstate 37 from Corpus Christi to San Antonio, then in counties along and Dallas-Ft. Worth Metroplex to the Oklahoma border.

The rules do not mandate or prohibit the use of the controversial gasoline additive MTBE. The TNRCC will continue to monitor the Environmental Protection Agency's blue-ribbon recommendations by the end of July.

The four-county Dallas-Ft. Worth ozone non-attainment area and the eight-county Houston-Galveston ozone non-attainment area are excluded from the new rules because they already participate in a more stringent federal reformulated gasoline program.

**AG Now Funding Child Centers**

Economic sanctions to achieve Farm Bureau Foundation.

"Currently, these sanctions apply commodities," said Charles Harbich, president of the Colorado County Farm Bureau.

American farmers and ranchers may not sell any products to Cuba, Iran, Iraq, Libya, North Korea and Sudan, Harbich said. "This takes 14% of our rice market, 10% of wheat, 5% of vegetable oil, and 4% of the corn market off the table," Harbich said. "It has a very major impact."

Since World War II, the U.S. has imposed sanction 104 times - 61 times since 1991. Representative Phil Crane (R-Illinois) has introduced the Sanction Reform Process Act, which would establish what he calls a "common sense procedural framework" for consideration of future sanctions. Under Crane's bill, Congress and presidential administrations would be required to conduct cost-benefit analyses and determine sanctions would achieve foreign policy goals.

"When Congress imposes sanctions, there may be the best of intentions, but not always a clear understanding of what the consequences are," Crane said.

Representative Bill Archer of Texas is a co-sponsor of the bill. "If all we do is deny our producers the ability to sell their products and services, only to see our competitors take over those markets, we are not accomplishing much," Archer said.

Harbich said the Farm Bureau supports efforts to exempt agriculture from unilateral economic sanctions.


