## E. Martin Hale

E. Martin Hale, 84, of Kerrville, Texas, passed away Thursday, July 15, 1999, at 8:30 p.m. at the Kerrville Rest Home.

He was born August 27, 1914, in Round Mountain, Texas, to William Agee and Stella Shelly Hale.

He lost his father in 1921, and his family moved to San Marcos in 1928.

He graduated from Southwest Texas Teacher's College with a B.A. degree in History, English and Music in 1937, where he was a member of the Alpha and Omega fraternity, also known as the White Stars.

He began his teaching career as high school band director in Eagle Lake, where he married Alice Mae

Thomas in 1941.

In 1942, he began a three-year service in the United States Army as band director of the 124th Cavalry Band in Ft. Riley, Kansas.

He taught in McCamey, Texas, for one year, then returned to his beloved Texas Hill Country as band director in Mason in 1950.

He attended the University of Texas at Austin during the summer and received an M.A. degree in education in 1952.

He left Mason to work for the Britannica Company, Education Division for three years.

He moved to Kerrville in 1963, where he was employed by the Kerrville Independent School District as Curriculum Director until his retirement in 1979.

A year later, he returned to work part-time in charge of maintaining all audio-visual equipment throughout the K.I.S.D. campuses, a job he continued until November 1998.

His life was dedicated to his family and to education. He was a positive influence and an invaluable role model for his many students throughout his career, through his undying faith in young people and his determination to contribute wherever he could to their growth and development. He truly made a difference.

He was preceded in death by his parents; two brothers, Alton Agee and

The Rev. Obie Rhodes, Moderator 20th Century District Association, gave the eulogy.

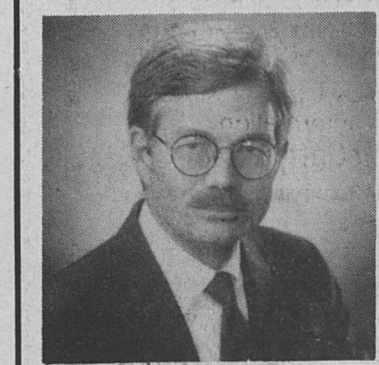
Interment followed in Sand Ridge Cemetery in Egypt.

### FINDING THE RIGHT RUNNING SHOE

Runners should choose the athletic shoe type best for their bio-mechanical needs. There are five basic running shoe categories: motion control, cushioned, lightweight training, trail, and stability. Motion control are best for people who overpronate, wear orthotics, have flat feet, or are heavy runners. Stability shoes are ideal for the midweight runner with normal arches looking for comfort and durability. Cushioned shoes offer the least medial support and encourage foot motion, ideal for runners with rigid feet and high arches. Lightweight training shoes are best for runners who want a light second shoe for fast-paced training. Finally, trail shoes should be considered by those who run off-road and need extra traction and protection from stone bruises.

## African Bishop declares Living Hope Church a 'House of Miracles'

Living Hope Church in Eagle Lake was pleased to host Bishop Francis Suza in special services on Sunday, June 20.

Suza, director of Gospel Commission Fellowship in Kericho, Kenya

oversees over 260 churches in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania. This was Suza's second visit to Living Hope and he was this year's recipient of Living Hope's Vacation Bible School (VBS) offering.

Suza spent the morning worship service describing his work in Africa. "Many Americans have a distorted view of Africa," said Suza. "Many of you may think that I preach with snakes hanging from the ceiling and a tiger peeking in the window. This is not so. Like many in Africa think that America is all glass and concrete. As if there were no trees, grass or cows."

Suza explained how he speaks in six languages, "In Kenya," he said, "we all must be fluent in English and Swahili, which are both considered national languages, and my wife and I are from different tribes, so I must speak both of those dialects, and I know something of two other tribal tongues spoken in some of my churches."

Living Hope has contributed to Suza's support on a monthly basis for the past eight years, and it was a blessing for many of the new members of Living Hope to meet him for the first time, and to hear how far the church's work goes.

In the morning, Suza announced that the Living Hope VBS offering would go to sponsor poor children in Kenya to his summer Bible program.

He also told how he appears on Kenyan national television weekly. This is an outstanding opportunity for ministry as there is only one television channel in the nation of 36 million people.

In the evening service, Suza taught the children to say "praise the Lord" in Swahili and taught on living in the power of Jesus' resurrection. Preaching from the third chapter of the book of Philippians, Suza encouraged the people to forget the sins and shortcomings of the past and press on toward God.

The concluding climax of the night was when Suza spoke prophetically to the church. He declared that Living Hope Church would be known as a "House of Miracles". He prayed for the leadership of the church, and exhorted Pastor Joe Fling to begin laying hands on people in expectation of God working miracles at Living Hope.

Pastor Fling expressed Living Hope's joy in having this excellent ministry in Eagle Lake, and confirmed the will of the Lord for the working of miracles. "We have been having regular times of praying for the sick, as well as occasional special services for salvation and healing, when we hang a banner declaring 'healing service' outside the church, and the bishop's word confirms to us that this is the will of God for the work here."
