"Changing times brought an economy crunch and a generation who doesn't sew. We had to cut down to closing at 1 p.m on Saturday and then closing all day. The town became pretty inactive after the bank began closing on Saturday.

"It came to the point that the store was only open certain days of the week, and with a personal health problem added to all this, I decided it was time to retire."

Dorothy graduated in May when she was 16, and immediately went to work for Southern Pacific in Hondo.

'I was scared to death when I boarded that train all by myself to go to Hondo, a girl of 16, having graduated from Crescent High School.'

Dorothy began sewing at any early age, with her mother as her inspiration. She won third place in her homemaking class at the age of 12 and, being the oldest in the Mahalitc family, sewed for all her brothers and
