# First Presbyterian Church to celebrate 90th anniversary

Sunday, Aug. 8, the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church celebrates the 90th anniversary of the founding of the church.

Morning worship begins at 10:30 a.m., followed by a covered dish luncheon in the Fellowship Hall at 11:45 a.m.

After lunch, a sing-along of old hymns requested by members ends the day's celebration. Tom Reed will serve as Emcee. Patty Stephens will be at the piano and Draper Stephens will lead the sing-along.

The following brief facts are excerpted from the 1984 commemorative history booklet.

The church had its beginning in a Bible study group, led by Mrs. E.W. Hanly. On Aug. 11, 1909, the Reverends L.E. Selfridge of Bay City and G.W Storey of Houston began holding services in Eagle Lake. Within two days, on the 13th of Aug., the congregation was organized with 11 charter members: Mrs. Nina Via, Mrs. D.B. Smith, Mrs. Lois Metcalf, Mrs. Luella Hanly, Mr. & Mrs. Walter F. Brown, Mrs. B.C. Smith, F.P. Via, George Redford, James Wright and Mrs. Ida Ernest.

After meeting for several years in homes, the local movie theatre, and other churches, the congregation completed its sanctuary in 1916. Services are still held in that building.

In 1937 an education building (currently the Fellowship Hall) and

In 1955 and 1956 a two-story Sunday School building was completed, the interior of the sanctuary was reversed with the entrance moved from the front to the side door near the back, and the sanctuary

In 1984, as part of the commemoration of the 75th anniversary, memorial stained glass windows were installed and dedicated.

The First Presbyterian Church was nurtured many fine dedicated Christians who have served God, their country and their community. With the perseverance and faith of their forefathers, the present generation continues to grow, to love and to serve.
