Harrys' 'payback' means funds for local scholarships

E.E. Harry and his wife, Ethel, presented the Eagle Lake Noon Lions Club a contribution of \$10,000 to be used for scholarships for area students.

Mr. Harry moved to Eagle Lake with his family from the Wallis area in 1927 when he was in the third grade and lived here until he completed eighth grade.

He and his wife felt it was now "payback time" and they should do something to help other youngsters in this area get a start in life.

He got his first paying job (delivering milk) in Eagle Lake, learning some valuable lesson.

There was a local family who wanted a pint of fresh milk delivered to their home each morning for break-

fast. Harry picked up the milk at a small dairy on Prairie Street near the eastern edge of town and transported it to the family each weekday morning before school and on weekends.

Mr. Harry received a penny a day for his work. On Fridays, he was paid seven cents.

On Saturday, his mother gave him and additional 3¢, enabling him to go to the movies, something he looked forward to each week.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry are retired and live near Cameron where he is a member of the Cameron Noon Lions Club.

Their contribution was a demonstration of Christian love and providing help for others.

The Eagle Lake Lions Club appreciates the confidence placed in them with this contribution.

The Weatherization Assistance Program is now taking applications. For an application, please call Bill or Helen at 512-237-2321 or 1-800-688-9065.

I. Program Goal

The Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) is designed to increase the energy efficiency of dwellings occupied by low income households, with priority given to the most vulnerable households, including the elderly, families with small children and families with disabled household members.

II. Program Objectives

The objectives of low income weatherization are as follows:

- To reduce utility costs for low income families, thereby providing additional funds for other household necessities.

- To increase the year-round comfort of families occupying low income dwellings.

- To help ensure that weatherized dwellings are free of energy related hazards to occupant's health and safety.

- To help reduce the Nation's energy consumption, mitigate the ever-increasing demand for additional electrical power and decrease the Country's dependence on Foreign energy sources.

III. Program Administration

Weatherization is administered at the state level by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. In the nine-county area comprised of Austin, Bastrop, Blanco, Caldwell, Colorado, Hays, Lee, Fayette and Ft. Bend Counties, the program is administered at the local level by Combined Community Action (CCA) of Smithville.

IV. Primary Program Measures

- Attic insulation
- Air leakage reduction (and blow-door testing)
- Window and door repair or replacement
- Installation of storm windows
- Repair/replacement of unsafe or inefficient heating and cooling equipment
- Minor energy-related repairs
