TPW biologist Max Traweek, from Kerrville north, believe hunters will likely have to do more scouting this season to find concentrations of birds. "Areas where it's starting to dry out will be more productive. As long as there's water near by and seed on the ground, the birds will come."

Some of the better dove hunting may be found this year on TPW public dove leases. Dove hunting rights to 142 lease units covering more than 45,000 acres have been purchased using funds from the Annual Public Hunting Permit.

For \$40, a hunter will have the hunting rights to any of these dove leases, as well as to over a million additional acres of public hunting lands in Texas.

Permits may be purchased wherever hunting licenses are sold.


Whitewing hunters are reminded that a \$7 white-winged dove stamp is required to hunt whitewings anywhere in Texas and that whitewing populations are expanding throughout much of the Central and South Zones, particularly near urban areas.

"Whitewing populations are expanding across the state," said Roberson, who noted breeding numbers have been observed as far north as Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

Many dove hunters can avoid taking any chances by purchasing the Super Combo license package, which for \$49 comes with resident hunting and fishing licenses, plus all seven special stamps - purchased separately, the package would cost \$82. Hunters are also reminded to renew their hunting licenses, which expire Aug. 31, before heading out on opening day.

Harvest Information Program (HIP) questions must be answered by anyone who plans to hunt migratory game birds in Texas. HIP certification will print on the license at the time of purchase after a brief series of questions have been answered.

Lifetime license holders must also be HIP-certified in order to hunt migratory birds.
