

rebate in the amount of \$15,858.22, up 9.02% from the \$14,546.11 received last Aug., bringing the City's year-todate total to \$100,585.22, 4.03% ahead of 1998. "Texas continues to gain new businesses and new jobs, and con-

sumer confidence remains high as the state economy continues to expand," Comptroller Rylander said. Aug. sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected by monthly
