RHS first football scrimmage is Friday

Friday, Aug. 20, Rice High School begins football season with a scrimmage against Van Vleck.

The scrimmage begins at 5 p.m. in Van Vleck with the underclassmen. The varsity will follow at approximately 7 p.m.

All Rice fans are urged to come see what the 1999 season has to offer.

"We are very young this year, but we have more team speed than before. It looks like we'll be starting eight underclassmen on defense, with seven of

those being sophomores," said their coach.

On offense, Rice will also be starting eight youngsters; three juniors and five sophomores. The core of seniors will have to lead these young men in the right direction and get the team started off correctly.

If the young guys mature mentally and keep growing, Rice will be dangerous defensively. The team has good speed on defense and some guys who will "bring the wood when they arrive to ball carriers," said their coach.

Offensively the team needs the young running backs to step up and produce. There is a quality group of receivers and a returning starter at quarterback that makes it look good on paper.

The offensive line is made up of all sophomores and juniors. "We need these guys to gel and come together as one," added their coach.

There is a change in the schedule. The second scrimmage against Boling is now going to be held Aug. 26. This is a Thursday with the scrimmage beginning at 5:30 p.m. at Raider Stadium.
