This was the 60th Anniversary Tour. The organizer of this extravaganza was Armstrong McCall.

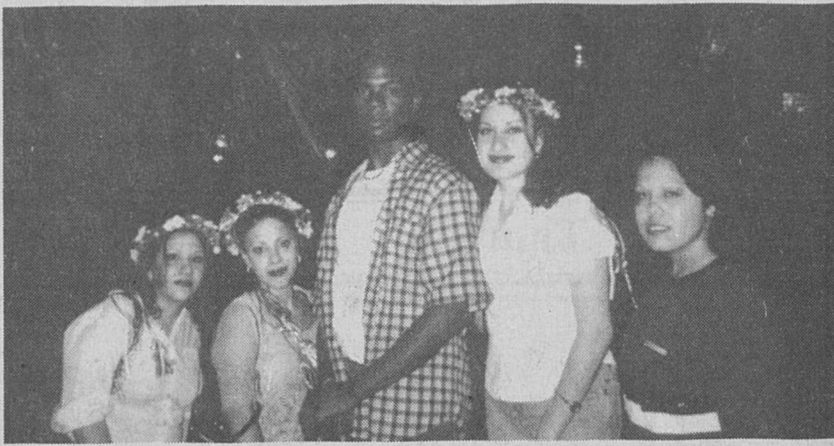
At this show, the students saw approximately 40 artists.

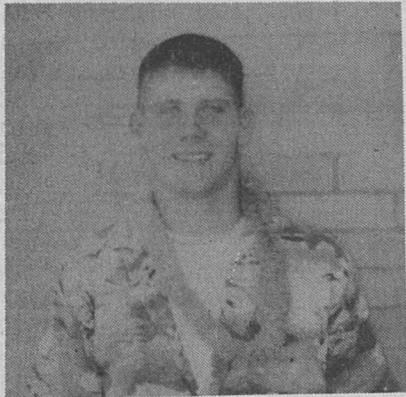
After having had a long day of teaching, Ms. Lopez likes to play bingo and spend time with her family in her free time.

WCJC students are admitted free of charge with valid school I.D.

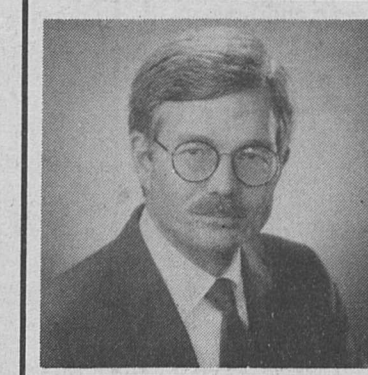
