Goes", and "Just Get Up And Close The Door."

In addition to the hits came the industry accolades, awards and even television/film roles, including a role on the TV show "Adam 12" and a guest appearance on the "Dating Game".

Since 1974, when Rodriguez made his debut as a TV actor, he has been a favorite on national talk shows and performance format shows. His emphasis, however, was still music-country music.

In 1979, Johnny moved from Mercury to Epic Records, where he worked with producer Bill Sherrill. His debut album with Epic, Rodriguez contained one exception, songs written by Johnny. His successes including: "What'll I Tell Virginia", "Love Look At Us Now", "North Of The Border", "Foolin'", "How Could I Love Her So Much" and "Rose Of My Heart".

The union of producer Tom Collins and Capitol Records in 1987 re-

sulted in Rodriguez' album titled "Gracias", which contained such hits as "I Didn't (Every Chance I Had)", "I Want To Wake Up With You" and "You Might Want To Use Me Again".

In 1993, Johnny Recorded "Fun For The Border", on Intersound and in 1996 he reunited with the Dea/Kennedy team to truly capture the fire and magic their past collaborations had with the creation of "You Can Say That Again".

In the past 25 years, Johnny has released 26 albums and charted some 45 singles. He has beat the pavement touring in every state in the US. and enjoys an enormous response when touring overseas in countries such as Switzerland, England, South Korea, France, Spain, East and West Germany, Japan, Belgium, Guam, Poland, Canada and Mexico.

This favored son of Texas has received standing ovations by audiences from Ryman Auditorium to Carnegie Hall. He has been honored with the presence of Presidents of the

United States including Jimmy Carter and playing the Inaugural Ball for George Bush.

Rodriguez has been highlighted for his contributions and placed in music's traditions and history. This artist brings the Hispanic communities and country music together with his bilingual songs.

Throughout the years, Rodriguez has risen from Sabinal to the top of the country music world and sunk close to the bottom again. He has crammed more living in those "wonder years" that most people see in a lifetime. With the love and support of his fans as well as some legendary names in the entertainment world, he has sustained. The hardships that Johnny Rodriguez has experienced throughout his long and lucrative career are reflected in the non-sense strength of his vocal style, which we are sure to enjoy for many years ahead.

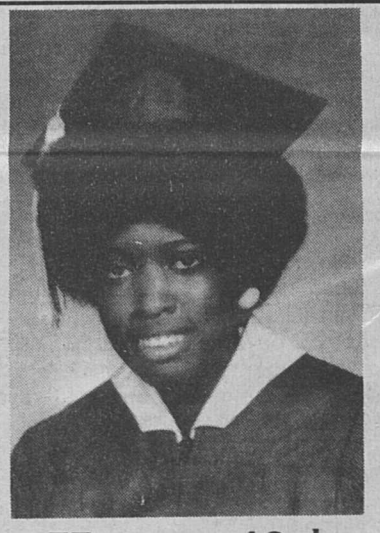

ing home residents and their families in cases where abuse is suspected.

If the situation warrants it, the project attorney makes referrals to

Foot Facts

PLANTAR FIBROMATOSIS

Plantar fibromatosis is a benign disorder where nodules form on the plantar fascia, the long tissue running from the bottom of the heel to the ball of the foot. The condition usually occurs around the arch, but it may develop anywhere along the plantar fascia. Nodules begin as pain-free bumps under the skin, but they can become painful during exercise. Redness or swelling may also occur. Most likely a hereditary disorder, plantar fibromatosis is also associated with infection, gout, lead poisoning, some metabolic diseases, or trauma from high-impact activities like running. Because surgically removing the nodules results in high recurrence rates, many doctors now recommend removing the entire plantar fascia if the nodules cause significant daily discomfort.

Views On Dental Health
 YOUR SENSITIVITY THRESHOLD
 If you are treated for gum disease and some of the roots of your teeth have been exposed, you may experience a temporary sensitivity to heat and cold. Much will depend on your sensitivity threshold and the extent of the treatment needed to restore your teeth and gums to a healthy condition.
 Whatever sensitivity you are feeling, however, can probably be reduced or eliminated. For instance, your dentist may apply stannous or sodium fluoride or some other solution to the root surface to eliminate the sensitivity. He may also recommend that you use a special toothpaste, such as Senso-dyne, to reduce the sensitivity more rapidly while your gums are healing.
 Whatever discomfort you may feel initially, however, is a small price to pay for saving your teeth. Gum disease is a major cause of tooth loss. It should be treated as promptly as possible by your dentist. If you have noticed occasional bleeding when you brush your teeth or any signs of gum discomfort, see your dentist for treatment.
