struments during the past few years. Many aren't aware that recently available digital hearing aids can help with many types of hearing loss that previously couldn't be effectively treated."

For instance, noise-induced hearing loss (often referred to as "ski slope" loss because of the steep decline shown on audiological hearing charts) can now be addressed with specialized instruments like Digifocus SKI, which relies on advanced software programming.

Many people born after 1940 have been hurt by loud noises as the work environment, music, power tools and traffic overstress the hearing system. People with noise-reduced hearing loss are particularly difficult to fit and many have tried and rejected conventional hearing aids in the past.

"Noise induced hearing loss is just one of the many different types of hearing loss that we'll be screening for," said Ruth. "We encourage anyone over the age of 50 to take advantage of these screenings and find out whether they have a hearing loss that needs attention. The consequences of avoiding treatment far outweigh the hesitancy many feel about dealing with hearing loss."

Hearing loss is one of the most prevalent chronic conditions in the U.S. More than 19 million Americans over the age of 45 have a hearing loss. Unfortunately, more than half of them do not seek treatment and are often not aware that the hearing loss may be the source of other health and quality of life issues with which they are dealing.
