

COLORADO COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

+11.77%*; El Campo, \$171,765.70, +3.16%; and Wharton, \$115,919.07, +5.73%.

Year-to-date for the above cities and the change from last year are: Columbus, \$718,063.32, +5.65%; Weimar, \$135,412.07, +10.09%; Sealy, \$1,110,638.00, +4.02%; Bellville, \$350,329.46, +51.21%*; El Campo, \$1,720,777.25, +7.55%; and Wharton, \$969,535.11, +1.27%.

On the county level, Colorado County received \$55,897.83, down 8.17% from last year's payment of \$60,871.29. Austin County received \$84,604.60, down 0.57%. Wharton County received \$109,575.89, up 4.03%.

Year-to-date figures for these Counties are, Colorado, \$589,920.07, up 7.63%; Austin, \$858,851.29, +1.52%; Wharton, \$1,184,284.35, +7.86%.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be Friday, Dec. 10. *Bellville increased their portion from 1% to 1.5% in Oct. 1998, therefore, this is not an accurate comparison.

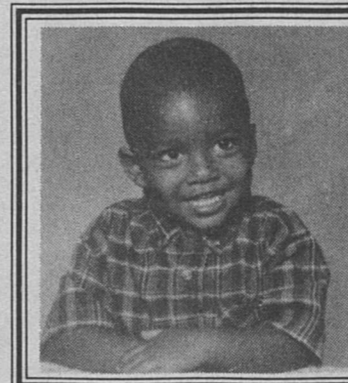

Officer Lasley assisted with traffic control at a two-car collision on FM 3013 at 7:40 a.m.

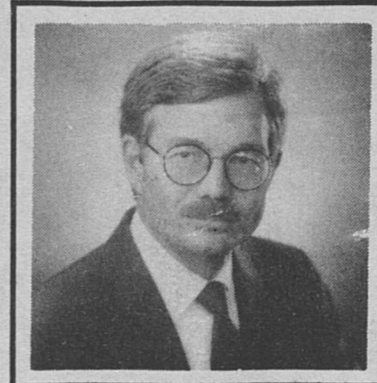
