Foot Facts

STRESS FRACTURES

Stress fractures are slight cracks in a bone's surface. Occurring most often in the feet and legs, stress fractures develop from chronic, excessive impact. Runners are especially susceptible to this type of injury. Intense pain and sharp, localized tenderness are the main symptoms of a stress fracture. The fracture will when pressed directly from above and, unlike tendons and ligaments, which usually only hurt when pressed from one side. X-rays usually do not detect stress fractures until a callus - a layer of new bone - forms over the crack, a process that takes two to three weeks. Rest is the most effective treatment for a stress fracture. Any inflammation may be relieved with ice and anti-inflammatory medications.

Your feet take a tremendous pounding. Walking on cement, for instance, can give each foot a 180-pound jolt with every step you take. This wear and tear can take its toll, sometimes causing stress fractures or even a broken bone. Combine this with poorly fitting shoes and you can end up with a lot of pain and an inability to move with ease. Don't let this happen to you. P.S. Individuals with stress fractures often switch temporarily to a different exercise program to prevent extension of the crack.

Quarterly Theme: "Missions, the Great Biblical Enterprise."

Basic Theme: First Week, "Christ's Commission and Christian Education" - 1 Peter 2:41

First Peter is one of the general epistles, bearing his name, the spokesman of the 12 disciples. The great commission given by our Lord, Christ Jesus, (Matt. 28), states, "teach them," (all believers).
