Plant Society to host author June 1

The Columbus Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas (NPSOT) will meet Thursday, June 1, at 7 p.m. at Nesbitt Memorial Library, 529 Washington, Columbus. Joe Lig-

gio, author and photographer of *Wild Orchids of Texas* (University of Texas Press, 1999) will present a slide show and talk.

From the East Texas swamps and forests to the Edwards Plateau canyons and the Trans-Pecos mountains, Texas hosts a surprising number of native orchids, 54 in all. They range from the bog-loving grass pink orchid (*Calopogon tuberosus*) of East Texas

to the saprophytic species - commonly known as coral root orchids - that have no green leaves or chlorophyll to produce nutrients, but subsist on decaying organic matter.

Liggio will show slides of some of these beautiful Texas orchids while describing unusual facts about their natural history and telling of his experiences in "orchid hunting" to write his book.

He will also discuss conservation issues such as preserving the habitats of these irreplaceable native orchids.

Liggio is an environmental consultant and freelance writer and pho-

tographer. His photographs and articles about Texas orchids and wildflowers have appeared in books, magazines and calendars. He has a B.S. degree in biology from Sam Houston State University and is currently completing an M.S. degree in environmental science from the University of Houston at Clear Lake.

Wild Orchids of Texas was co-authored by his wife, Ann, who is a freelance writer and editor. The Liggios live in Houston.

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someone wait near the street or in a parking lot to direct EMS to the victim. Most important-stay on the line until the dispatcher tells you to hang up.

Remember not to move the ill or injured person unless that person is in immediate danger. Don't give them anything to eat or drink and do not allow him or her to smoke. Keep the person calm and still.

The Texas Trauma System consists of 173 trauma centers, coordinating a patient's in-hospital care so the ill or injured person receives the type of care needed.

"While we can be proud of the emergency medical services in Texas," Perkins said, "prevention is still the best way to avoid accidental or premature death." Learning CPR and the Heimlich maneuver are ways to begin.

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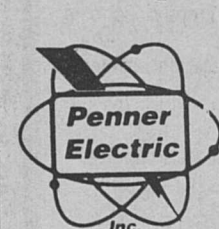
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County Tour set for June 8
