

Producers to face new regulations

Colorado County agricultural producers will face a whole new set of regulations governing off-road diesel use and permitting beginning Sept. 1

as the result of Senate Bill (SB) 1547. A series of meetings are being held statewide to explain the new regulations, according to Colorado County

Farm Bureau President Charles Harbich.

SB 1547, passed by the 76th Legislature, limits the sale of tax-free, undyed diesel to agricultural users and requires anyone using a signed statement to purchase tax-free, dyed diesel fuel to register with the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The seminars are sponsored by the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association for their dealer/distributor members. Tax-exempt customers of those dealers are invited to attend.

Story Hour programs include:

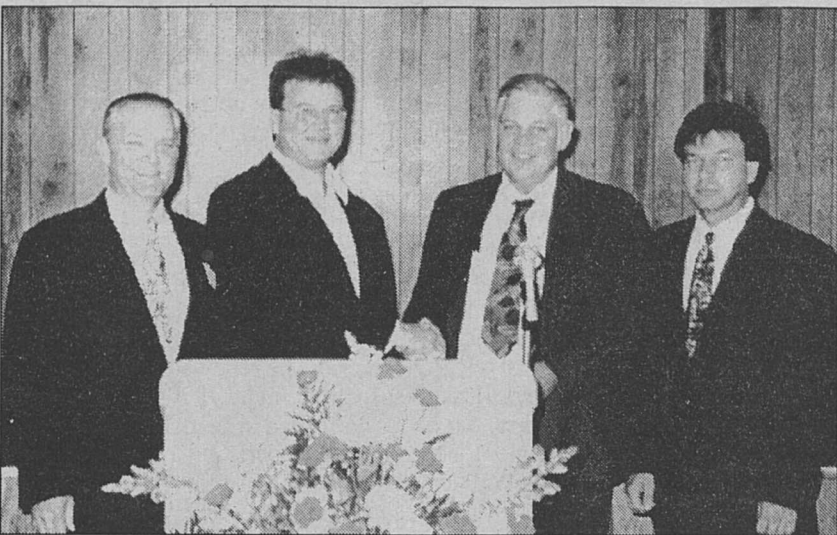

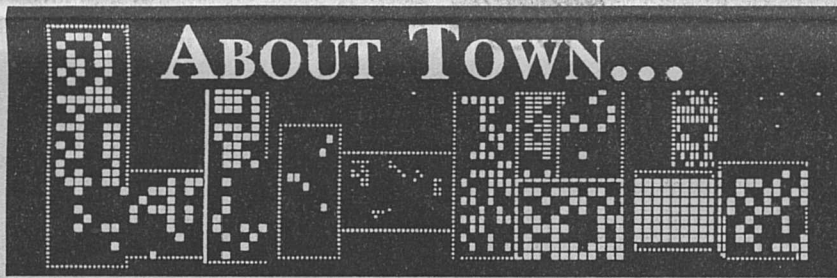
Texas Exes remember A&M's fallen
