Later teal season, crane zone changes await federal approval

Changes to Texas migratory game bird regulations adopted June 1 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) Commission could mean better hunting for teal and more opportunity for hunting sandhill crane.

Included in the 2000-2001 Migratory Game Bird Proclamation is a 16-day teal season Sept. 15-30, which biologists say could dramatically increase hunter success. As with all migratory game bird regulation changes, the teal season dates are tentative until the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) finalizes the standards for the Central Flyway this summer.

"Because we have to set the entire teal season within the month of September, we felt that opening the season as late in the month as possible would be the best option for hunter success," said Vernon Beville, director of the TPW migratory game bird program. Sept. 15 means opening teal season on a Friday and closing it on a Saturday, Sept. 30.

By delaying the 16-day teal season opener until Sept. 15 rather than the second Saturday (Sept. 9), hunters will likely see more birds migrating into Texas, predicts Beville. Teal harvest data collected by the department show that hunters average fewer than two birds a day before Sept. 14 and more than two per day after Sept. 14.

In another move aimed at hunter opportunity, TPW adopted options for extending sandhill crane hunting in two areas along the middle and lower coast. The agency left some flexibility in its final rule-making decision, to allow for direction from the federal level later this month and will seek the most liberal option.

TPW's preferred option would extend the Zone C sandhill crane hunting area along the mid and lower coast with a three-day bird daily bag limit. If USFWS restricts bag limits on sandhills to fewer than three birds daily in the extended areas of Zone C, Texas would opt to create a Zone D to include only the new coastal areas,

with a two-or one-bird daily bag and leave the other three zones intact with a three-bird bag.

Another alternative should USFWS not approve the extended areas of Zone C would be to revert to last year's crane boundaries with a statewide three-bird daily bag.

Following are season dates for migratory game bird hunting seasons in Texas for 2000-01 as recommended by TPW:

Dove: Sept. 1-Oct. 30 in the North Zone; Sept. 1-Oct. 17 and Dec. 26-Jan. 7 in the Central Zone; and Sept. 22-Nov. 5 and Dec. 26-Jan. 9 in the South Zone. The proposed white-winged dove season is Sept. 2, 3, 9 and 10 in the Special White-winged Dove Area of South Texas.

Teal: Sept. 15-30.

Sandhill Crane: Nov. 11-Feb. 11 in Zone A; Dec. 2-Feb. 11 in Zone B; and Dec. 30-Feb. 4 in Zone C.

Rail, Gallinule: Sept. 15-30 and Oct. 28-Dec. 20.

Views On Dental Health

CAN PACIFIER CAUSE "BUCK" TEETH?

We are often asked if pacifiers cause "buck teeth" in children. The answer to that question depends on the age of the child. For the first three years or so, the baby's sucking actually helps strengthen the tongue and lip muscles. Teeth don't automatically come into the right places... and the tongue and lips play an important role in guiding the primary teeth into the right alignment. Then the primary teeth help the permanent ones come in correctly.

Most children have already given up their pacifiers by the time their permanent teeth start erupting, around

age five. If they haven't, that's when the habit could lead to "buck" teeth or some other bite problem that would require orthodontic correction. So, pacifiers are fine for the first two or three years. After that, parents should help their children give it up.

Never give a child a bottle of milk or fruit juice at bedtime or for long periods as a pacifier substitute. The front teeth may quickly develop decay.
