## Use caution with fireworks for a safer July 4th

Picnics, parades, family gatherings and fireworks mark many tradi- buildings or cars. tional Independence Day celebrations. Unfortunately, there is another all too common occurrence-injuries ing fireworks. from fireworks.

The Consumer Product Safety made ones. Commission (CPSC) reports approximately 8,500 people were injured from fireworks in the United States in 1998. Two-thirds of all such injuries occur during July.

Males are three times likely to suffer injuries from fireworks than are females and more than 40% of those injured are 14 years old or younger.

The pattern is similar in Texas. than half of all reported fireworks related injuries occurred around the 4th of July, according to data from the Texas Trauma Registry of the Texas Department of Health's Injury Epidemiology and Surveillance Program.

All but two of the patients reported to the registry were male and 60% were under age 18. Most patients suf-

Not all of those injured were lighting the fireworks, some were bystanders who were too close.

Public fireworks displays run by professionals are generally safer than using fireworks yourself. However, if fireworks are legal in your area and you decide to use them, follow these CPSC guidelines:

•Follow all state and local laws. ·Buy from reputable dealers. Ask tion. to see their permit.
