Only In America...

Only In America... can a pizza get to your house faster than an ambulance... are there handicap parking places in front of a skating rink... do drugstores make the sick walk all the way to the back of the store to get their prescriptions, while healthy people can buy cigarettes at the front... do people order double cheeseburgers, large fries and a diet Coke... do banks leave both doors open and then chain the pens to the counters... do we use the word "politics" to describe the process so well: "Poli" in Latin meaning "many" and "tics" meaning "bloodsucking creatures"... can a homeless combat veteran live in a cardboard box while a draft dodger can live in the White House.

For those on the Internet, you may have read this before. There is an e-mail being circulated with this message and more comparisons. Some of these statements seem amusing, but, to me, most of them are sad and cause me to be concerned about where our country is headed.

Another such paradox occurred recently in a dispute between the US

and the European Union. This country was dealt a sharp defeat by the unelected board of international bureaucrats in the World Trade Organization (WTO).

According to the WTO, the "\$2.2 billion of the United States reductions for American businesses violates the WTO rules and must be eliminated by Oct. 1 of this year." How can this be!

A country whose founders rebelled against taxation without representation and drafted a Constitution that requires all appropriation bills originate in the House and farther specified that only Congress has the power to levy and collect taxes, now finds its very sovereignty challenged by the WTO dictating that US businesses cannot keep more of their own profits, which could ultimately help increase workers pay and reduce consumer cost.

Is it any wonder that there have been massive protests and objections recently in Seattle and Washington concerning our involvement in the WTO. Perhaps more of us should make our objections known.

In March, Congressman Ron Paul introduced HJR 90 that would withdraw approval of the U.S. from the agreement establishing the WTO. This bill was voted on this week and while there were nine bipartisan co-signers, this legislation was defeated by a 56 to 363 vote.

It is obvious that too many of our elected officials do not understand our Constitution nor the implications of losing our national sovereignty. I certainly do not advocate physical protests or riots, but I do urge all fellow citizens to be informed and make your views known to your elected officials.

We in the 14th Congressional District are fortunate to have a Congressman who fully understands our Constitution and who is willing to take a stand to uphold it. You may like to express your appreciation to Congressman Paul for his efforts to protect our Constitution and our national sovereignty.

We must remain diligent in our own efforts, if we are indeed to remain free!

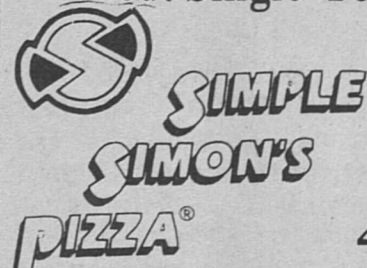
