LCRA awards \$25,000 grant to ELVFD

The Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) has awarded a \$25,000 grant to the Eagle Lake Volunteer Fire Department (ELVFD) to buy a truck to respond to brush and

The department responds to 75% of fires in Colorado County in rough, rural land. The newer truck will be better able to transport firefighters to emergency calls.

The grant is one of 33 totaling \$498,839 which were awarded recently through LCRA's Community Development Partnership Program, now in its fifth year. The program provides economic development and community assistance grants to cities, counties, volunteer fire departments, regional development councils and other nonprofit organizations in LCRA's 58-county electric and water
