

First Historic Landmark Plaque issued

The Eagle Lake Preservation Alliance (ELPA) issued its first local Historic Landmark Plaque to the Calaboose, located on S. McCarty between Dairy Queen and the Eagle Lake Supermarket, during ceremonies and a reception held Tuesday, July 18.

According to research done and presented by Crystal Cameron, the Calaboose was built in May 1904 as the City's first jail. It was constructed by G.W. Keith, a local contractor, at a cost of \$250. The land was purchased from J.W. McCarty, Eagle Lake's first elected mayor, for \$50.

The Alliance would like to apply for a Texas Historical Landmark for the building, but needs a picture of it taken at least 50 years ago. Not only is the picture required for the State designation, but it will assist the Alliance in making its restoration of the Calaboose accurate.

Water conservation advisory in effect

According to Eagle Lake Mayor Michael Cooper, a water conservation advisory is in effect for the City.

The advisory went into effect when water usage in the City was at 950,000 gallons per day for more than five days last week.

"Please conserve as much water as possible," Cooper requested. "When (or if you must) water your lawn, please do so between midnight and 10 a.m. in order to take some of the burden off our pumps."

The conservation is voluntary at the moment; no citations will be issued. But, if usage exceeds 1 million gallons a day, more stringent measures will begin.

Watering during the night and early morning hours not only helps relieve the workload on the pumps, but it saves you money. During the hot mid-day hours, a percentage of the water you're trying to get to your lawn and/or garden evaporates, therefore costing you more per useful

Also, watering some plants during the heat of the day could cause damage to the leaves.
