Fifty-seven years ago, at exactly 1:30 p.m. one of this community's young men died in service and defense of his country and in defending crewmen and service personnel on board LST 473 just off of the shores of Lae, New Guinea.

United States Navy Seaman First Class Johnnie David Hutchins, mortally wounded, used every ounce of strength still in his shattered body to turn the LST out of the path of torpedoes dropped by Japanese attacking the invading force of the United
