Corns and calluses develop when the skin thickens and toughens due to pressure from shoes, weight-bearing activities, or abnormal alignment of the bones in the ball of the foot. Corns typically occur on the toes, calluses on the bottom of the foot. Each type of lesion, called hyperkeratosis, has a central core that lies deeper than the excess layer of dead skin cells. This nucleation, the site of greatest pressure, is sometimes particularly tender. The pressure often results due to a prominence of underlying bone pushing against the skin. To relieve the pressure and discomfort, a podiatrist may reduce or surgically remove any bony prominence at the nucleation. If core pressure is not permanently relieved, corns and calluses

WHAT CAUSES CROOKED TEETH?

Malocclusion, the technical term for thumb-sucking, lip-biting, and tonguea misaligned bite or crooked teeth, can be either inherited or acquired.

The most common inherited problems are caused when iaw size is inappropriate for the room requirement of the teeth. If the jaw is too small, the teeth will be crowded; they'll grow in crooked as they compete for space and may overlap or protrude as a result. On the other hand, if the jaw is too large, the spaces between the teeth may be wide enough to allow them to tip and be

Acquired malocclusions are usu-

thrusting. It can also result from mouth injuries, tooth decay, or gum disease any of which can cause loss of primary or permanent teeth, opening spaces on the jaw that can lead to tipped, misaligned teeth.

Whatever the cause, malocclusion can be corrected through orthodontic treatment which will improve the patient's appearance and also make it easier to clean and care for all the teeth.
