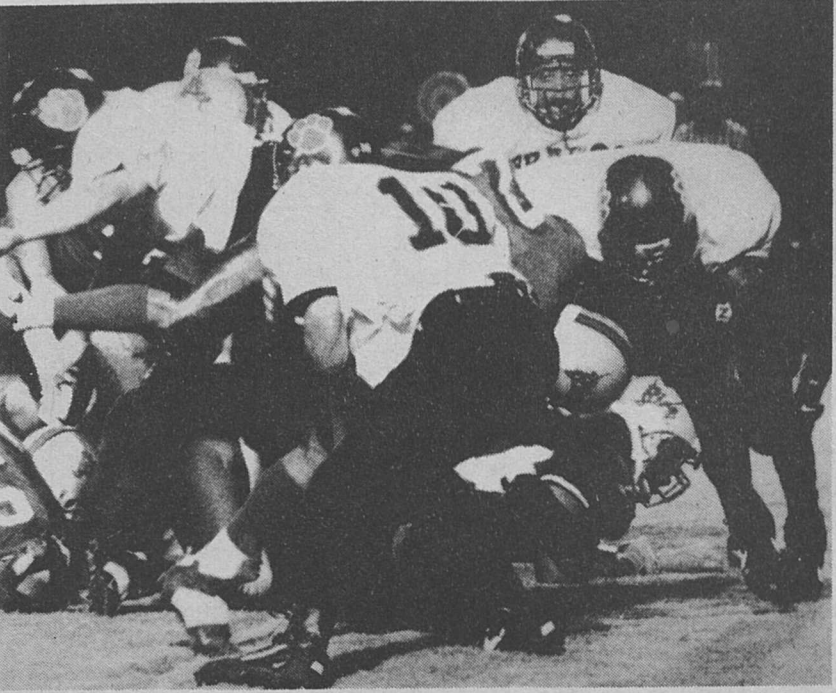

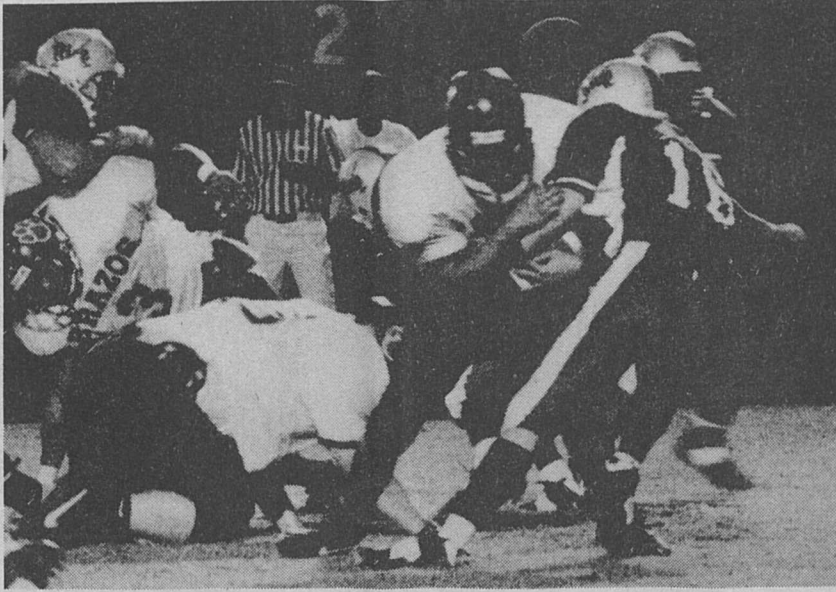

## County Hay Show deadline is Sept. 26

The annual Colorado County Hay Show will be held Wednesday, Oct. 11, beginning at 4 p.m. in the Nada Community Center.

Dr. David Bade, Extension Agonomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAES), will serve as judge for the show and will give an educational program on managing forages and hay for top production under drought conditions.

The County Hay Show has been an excellent opportunity for hay producers to evaluate different types of hay and understand the importance of quality hay production.

If you are interested in entering a hay sample for this year's show,

please submit on or before Sept. 26.

Samples should consist of a feed bag full of hay from round bales or two blocks of hay from a square bale.

Each sample should include your name, address, sample number and hay type.

Hay samples may be submitted to the following locations: County Extension Office, Colorado Feed, Columbus Agri Center and Heffley's Mill and Grain in Columbus; M-G Inc. Farm Service in Weimar; Heinsohn's Store in Frelsburg; Bernardo Farm and Ranch Supply, Bernardo; Eagle Lake General Store, Eagle Lake; Farmer's Co-op, Garwood.

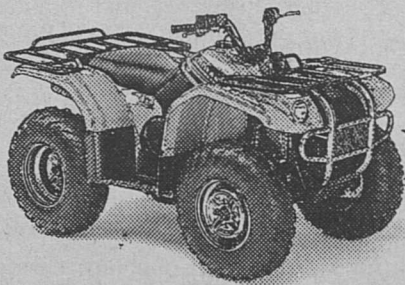
