

Qualifications for early, mail voting

The law requires that the address to which the ballot is going to be mailed must be the residence address of the Voter indicated on the mailing address record with the Voter Registrar. The exceptions to the rules are:

1. THE VOTER IS 65 OR OLDER OR DISABLED:

If the grounds for voting by mail is either 65, or over, or disability, the application must give the address of a hospital, nursing home, long term care facility, or retirement center, or the address of a relative within the second degree of affinity or third degree of consanguinity, with whom the applicant is living.

2. IF THE VOTER IS CONFINED TO JAIL:

If the reason is confinement to jail, the application must give the address of the jail facility at which the voter is confined, or the address of a relative with the second degree of affinity or third degree of consanguinity.

3. IF THE VOTER IS EXPECTED TO BE ABSENT FROM THE COUNTY:

If the voter is expected to be absent from the county on election day during Clerk's regular office hours for the remainder of the early voting period, the application must give an out of county address to mail the ballot, if submitted after early voting in person has begun.

a.) EARLY VOTING BY PERSONAL MAIL APPEARANCE BEGINS: OCT. 31, 2000.

b.) PERSONS VOTING EARLY BY MAIL: Must have their applications in the County Clerk's Office by the close of regular business hours on Oct. 31, 2000.

c.) PERSONS VOTING EARLY BY PERSONAL APPEARANCE: May vote at the County Clerk's Office, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. beginning Oct. 23, 2000 through Nov. 3, 2000.

d.) EARLY VOTING: Will be conducted in the County Clerk's Office on Saturday, Oct. 28, 2000 from 9

a.m. to 3 p.m. for the convenience of the voters who cannot vote on Tuesday, Nov. 7, 2000 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. You do not have to have an excuse to vote early in person. You may do so for your convenience.

LIMITED BALLOT:

1. The Election Code authorizes voting a limited ballot after changing county of residence.

2. The person voting a limited ballot under section 112.001 of the Texas Election Code is entitled to vote only on each office or measure to be voted in a territorial unit, state or district of which the person was resident both before changing their county of residence and after the change.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. After changing residence to another county, a person is eligible to

vote a limited ballot by personal appearance or by mail if:

a. The person would have been eligible to vote in the county of former residence on election day if still residing in the county.

b. The date of the election is not more than 90 days after the new residence was established. A voter registration for the person in the county of new residence is not effective on or before election day.

2. A person is not eligible to vote a limited ballot by mail unless in addition to satisfying the eligibility requirements prescribed above, the person is eligible to vote early by mail under the standard early mail rules.

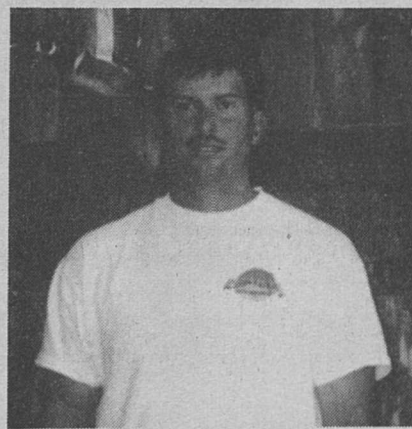
Our library is growing but needs everyone's help to continue to be "up to date" in this computer age.

Special Notice from Police Chief Keith Webb

Many Eagle Lake citizens have called me and have asked about the city's policy regulating the installation and operation of residential and business burglar alarms.

At this time, the City of Eagle Lake does not have a city ordinance regulating alarms and currently do not require alarm permits as do other cities.

The purposes of such regulations would be to help limit the number of false alarms being reported to the police department. Many cities have found that their police department spends too much time answering false alarms; time which takes them away from patrolling other residences, and they feel that those individuals should

be penalized after a certain number of false alarms have occurred during a given year.

It was brought to my attention, by Mr. Roy Van Nort, that other cities have reported that individuals are calling residents offering to install alarm systems and some of these individuals are being deceptive. The individual may be trying to cheat you out of your money, or they may be attempting to gain entry into your house for reasons other than legitimate ones.

Please check out a company thoroughly before giving them access to any personal information or to your home. If you desire an alarm system, ask your neighbors who may already have one to seek out a reputable company.

Most reputable companies in our area will be working out of the Houston or Austin area. Check the Better Business Bureau (BBB) in those cities to see if those companies are members or if there are any complaints on file with them.
