

Weekend bust snags three in Eagle Lake

Over the weekend, Colorado County Sheriff's Department, working with the Eagle Lake Police Department, concluded a narcotics operation which resulted in the arrest of three suspects from the Eagle Lake area for distributing cocaine.

The investigation was initiated in March of 1999 by Chief Deputy Schleider and Eagle Lake Police Sgt. Tim Crume who utilized a confiden-

tial informant who bought cocaine from the suspects. On Friday, Oct. 23, Justice of the Peace Pct. 4 Mary Ordner issued

three warrants for delivery of a controlled substance. Patrick Casanova, 19, and Adam Leal, 24, both of Eagle Lake, were

arrested for the third degree felony of delivery of a controlled substance in penalty group one. When serving the third warrant for delivery on Vicki Ebarra, 32, of Eagle Lake, Deputy Schleider located eight small bags of cocaine in her

purse along with almost \$900 in cash. Ebarra was also charged with the second degree felony of possession of controlled substance in penalty group one.
