Pesticide recertification course offered

For those persons whose pesticide applicator license expires at the end of this year, a recertification course will be held Thursday, Nov. 2, at the Nada Community Center, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Pre-registration is required. The fee is \$10 per person, \$15 at the door, and includes lunch and breaks.

Those planning to attend need to call the County Extension Office at 979-732-2082 to register and pay fees by 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 27.

This course, qualifying for 8 CEU hours and covering a wide variety of subjects, is sponsored by Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Colorado County Row Crop Committee.

Private applicators need to keep in mind that most agriculture programs conducted by Texas Agricultural Extension Service qualify for CEUs. So, in a five year period, all CEUs needed can be earned by attending Extension-sponsored educational programs.
